

Dear Friends,

In January 2016, the City of Chicago conducted its annual point-in-time homeless count. The count, which takes place throughout the city of Chicago, travels through various neighborhoods, overnight shelters and even public transportation lines. Deborah's Place is one of only two agencies that coordinates volunteers for the count on the West Side. The results of the count showed that while the overall number of people who are homeless has decreased, there's been an increase in the number of unaccompanied and unsheltered women.

What does this mean for Deborah's Place? In order to answer this question, we began our strategic planning process in March, a year earlier than scheduled. While the plan is still in progress, one thing we know is that we want to serve more women. And according to the point-in-time count, there are still many who need our services.

To help women move on from the experience of homelessness, we have expanded our community based services and launched a transitions program to accommodate more women. In fiscal year 2016, we helped 49 women move from the streets and shelters into interim and permanent supportive housing, and 54 women moved on from Deborah's Place housing into more independent living. In this report, you can read about Nancy and her journey of moving on and becoming more independent.

We hope for a future when no woman has to experience homelessness, but until that day, Deborah's Place is committed to opening doors of opportunity for those who need us. We thank you for investing in our work and in the women we serve.

### Nancy's Moving On Story



Last summer, Nancy received a subsidy from the city that allows her to live independently after thirteen years in supportive housing at Deborah's Place in the Rebecca Johnson Apartments. She waited more than a year to hear if she was approved for the subsidy. She recently moved into her new apartment, right around the corner from her home at Deborah's Place. Now, she is ready to make a new home and a new start.

Nancy endured an abusive and isolated familyenvironmentinherearlylife. Keptinside the house and made to cook and clean, Nancy wasn't allowed to go to school, work

and church. So when her parents died unexpectedly, she was left completely unprepared to live on her own. With nowhere to turn, she accumulated debt, developed a substance use problem and became homeless.

In 2003, after decades of life on the street, she came to Deborah's Place and began to learn how to care for herself. "This place has helped me grow. Spiritually and physically, I've learned how to take care of myself better. I've learned how to survive as a human being and be on the right track."

Nancy credits Deborah's Place with giving her the security to grow and the tools she needs to succeed. Case management helped her get a steady income from employment and public assistance. She was able to fix her credit, open a bank account and begin saving money. At the learning center, she was encouraged to express herself through writing. She's had some personal essays and opinion articles published, particularly about food deserts and scarcity in impoverished communities, like East Garfield Park.

While Nancy is grateful to Deborah's Place for its role in her recovery, she is ready to move on. She looks forward to her grandchildren being able to sleep over at her apartment when they visit. Also, thanks to her work with her Deborah's Place case manager and an employment specialist, Nancy received job training and began a new job through the Easterseals Senior Community Service Employment Program.

But as excited as she is to live independently, she is still tearful when she speaks about leaving Deborah's Place. "I grew up here," she said. "Those 13 years that I was here, I grew up. Because I really knew



nothing, and I learned... how to deal with people, how to accept people as they are, because I want to be accepted..." Leaving is bittersweet, because as she says, Deborah's Place makes her feel safe and cared about. "I've met people here who want me to do better, who want me to make it."

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
